


What's up everyone?



something that happened. They did not gain or grow in their understanding and appreciation of God. They already knew all this stuff. For them, singing would have been insensitive.



There are two people called Yonadav. Yona = dove.






# PARSHAL PARSHA

a brief summary of the weekly Torah porshon

#### **PARSHAS BESHALACH-**

WE JUMP INTO THE WATER AND STAY DRY, THEN HAVE A DANCE PARTY.

- AS THE JEWS RUN AWAY (DOO DOO DOO DOO DOODOO), RUN AWAY (DOO DOO DOO DOODOO), RUN AWAY (DOO DOO DOODOO DOODOO), RUN AWAY FROM EGYPT, THEY DON'T GO THE SHORTEST ROUTE TO ISRAEL, BUT INSTEAD CIRCLE AROUND TO THE YAM SUF (SEA OF REEDS).
- MOSES PERSONALLY BRINGS JOSEPH'S BONES, TO FULFILL THE OATH OSEPH'S BROTHERS HAD TAKEN.
- GOD PROVIDES A PILLAR OF CLOUD TO GUIDE THEM DURING DAYLIGHT HOURS, AND A PILLAR OF FIRE TO GUIDE THEM AT NIGHT, IN CASE THEIR HEADLIGHTS WOULDN'T WORK.
- PHARAOH FEELS REALLY DUMB FOR LETTING HIS SLAVES GO, AND HE GATHERS HIS ARMY TO CHASE THEM.

- MIRIAM LEADS THE WOMEN, MANY OF WHOM, IN ANTICIPATION



- MOSES SAVES ONE CONTAINER OF THIS MANNA TO LAST FOREVER. | WONDER WHAT PRESERVATIVES THEY USED.
- THE PEOPLE AGAIN COMPLAINED THAT THEY WERE THIRSTY. MOSES HITS A ROCK (HE WAS SUPPOSED TO, THIS TIME) AND ENOUGH WATER COMES OUT TO GIVE THE ENTIRE NATION.
- THE NATION OF AMALEK BECOMES THE FIRST GROUP TO ATTACK THE JEWISH PEOPLE AFTER THE MIRACLES LEAVING EGYPT. THOSE SILLY AMALEKITES. WHAT WERE THEY THINKING? #### Distinguished Doer

Rabbi Shamshon Rafael Hirsch was one of the great leaders of the Jewish community in Germany for much of the 19th century. At that time, Jewish observance and study in Germany had been disappearing (sound familiar?) and acting as the Rabbi of the Frankfurt community, Rabbi Hirsch succeeded in slowing the tide of assimilation and creating a very strong, comitted and knowledgeable Jewish community in Germany. He worked really hard to ensure meaningful Jewish continuity.

He wrote several books including Horeb, Nineteen Letters and Commentary on the

## CLOUDY WITH A CHANCE OF PICKLES

Hi Rabbi,

What's the purpose of huge miracles like the splitting of the sea and the plagues? Bread falling from the sky??? And if they're important, why don't they happen all the time?

Dear Flint,

You're scootering to school and you get to a red light. You stop, waiting patiently for the WALK light to come on, right next to a mom holding the hand of a pre-schooler with a runny nose. You want to get out of there, but the light just isn't changing. Then you notice there's one of those thingies. You know, the pushy-light-changey-button-thingies. Do you push the button? Of course you push the button (maybe get a pump of hand sanitizer ready because of that runny nose kid). Does is work? Does it matter? Facts are that (mostly in large cities) the majority of pedestrian crossing buttons aren't actually hooked up to anything. So if you're reading this in Summerlin or Scottsdale, Irvine or Park City- places without a ton of traffic- those buttons actually do work, and often the light won't change without pushing one. But if you're in LA, downtown Las Vegas or Oakland, there's a good chance that button pushing doesn't do a thing. In New York City for example, only about 10 percent of those buttons function. There's a complex computer algorithm that controls when the light changes, and there's nothing you can do about it. I know, I've just ruined your life. Sorry. Really. I have a button you can push to make it better...

So why do cities maintain these pedestrian crossing buttons if they don't work? It's called the placebo effect. If you have to wait a while for the light to change, it can get very frustrating, but if you think you have control over it, then it's easier to deal with the time. The exact same amount of time waiting at the light seems



more manageable situation, because you were a part of the process. This is another great example of how human perceptions greatly change how we feel about things.

Where does our food come from?
The microwave.
That's depressing. What about before that?
The fridge?
OK, and how does it get to your fridge?
Instacart.

I can keep going but I will, very uncharacteristically, hold myself back. We are conditioned to believe in cause and effect. You plant a seed, it grows. You do a job, you get a paycheck. You pickle a pickle and it becomes a pickle squared. But that's not RE-ALLY how the world works. We learn that in this week's Torah portion. Bread doesn't come from the ground. It comes from God. Sometimes God brings it forth from the ground, sometimes from the sky, and perhaps sometimes from someone's elbow (I think that's where macaroni comes from). Gravity? Not a real thing. Historically, God seems to have wanted things to fall when dropped. But when he wanted to move water out of the sea? No worries. Miracles are not really miracles. They just show us that nature is an illusion.

So if miracles are so understandable and easy for God, why don't they happen all the time? Why don't we live in Cloudy with a Chance of Meatballs? The placebo effect. We push buttons because it makes us feel like we're doing something. We go to work, cook food, plant stuff and double pickle things because it gives us the illusion that we have control. This makes it harder to fully trust in God, and allows us free choice. It creates a hiding place for God.

So let's recognize that there's a complex algorithm running everything. Or maybe alGODrithm... but let's push that button thingy anyway. Though it would be cool if it rained pickles every once in a while.




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#### Torat Scene-A-Eye Explained
